



Description

Bouteloua gracilis is a fine-textured grass, native to the high dry plains of the West and Midwest US. Like many grasses, it will shut down and turn brown, as a drought response, but, will green up when moisture is back in the soil. This species produces viable seed and is, therefore, more successful when used on a large scale, where self-sowing is an advantage. The seed heads/flowers look like Scottish eyebrows, although it is a North American Native. Can be established as a meadow and be mowed. As with most grasses on green roofs, it will benefit from growing in a deeper soil profile, or in mounded green roof media, as well as regular watering, to help establishment. Adds height to the green roof ecosystem creating the opportunity for more biodiversity.
